Union Pines Band Biography

The Union Pines Band program consists of 140 band students, which is a rather large percentage of the school, greater than 13 percent of the student body. Union Pines High School is located in a small town, and the fact that the band is extremely large in this type of atmosphere is equally impressive. The band is very competitive, and they compete in the largest divisions, classes 4A and 5A, even though Union Pines High School is classified as a 3A school. In the fall semester, the marching band competes regularly, and has brought much prestige to the school through their superior quality of performance. Also, during the fall semester, the jazz band performs in many professional venues with famous artists and acts as a public relations group, performing at many high profile events. During the spring semester, the marching band and jazz band break into three concert bands: the Wind Ensemble, the Symphonic Band, and the Concert Band. All concert bands compete at state level contest each year, and have all received excellent and superior ratings in grade levels III through VI (the highest graded level of music). They have also received excellent and superior ratings at many out of state competitions where they have competed against many bands across the country. They are a great asset to the school and the community, and they can be seen frequently at many events in Moore County, including the Fourth of July parade in Carthage, the Carthage and Southern Pines holiday parades, the Carthage Veterans Memorial Service, the Carthage Buggy Festival, Military Child Appreciation Day, and many other town events. Their mission is to bring joy to their audiences through their talent of music and marching.

The Union Pines High Bands, under the direction of Rob Hill, have brought home several prestigious awards in recent years. The marching band has received straight superior ratings in competition for the past 13 years in a row. This year alone, the Marching Vikings placed first in many competitions to include winning two Grand Champion trophies at the Havoc in Hawks Nest Competition and at the Brick Capital Classic. They also placed first in many judged caption areas such as music ensemble, horn line, marching, color guard, drum major, and general effect. The percussion section has also received the top overall percussion score numerous times where they were the top group out of 22 bands in competition. The U.P. Color guard takes top placement and scores numerous times as well during the competitive marching season.

In recent years, the Marching Vikings have had outstanding seasons as well, having placed in every competition entered for class 4A and 5A. They have competed across the state of North Carolina at Albemarle, Scotland County, Pinecrest, South View, Fuquay-Varina, Clinton, Cape Fear, Randolph County, Lee County, Clayton, Kernersville, and Blue Stone, VA. Their awards included superior ratings, and many first places for marching, general effect, music, drum majors, color guard, and percussion. They have also been the Grand Champion Band numerous times for highest overall score of the day, and have also received the People's Choice Award a number of times, voted on by the audience for favorite band of the day.

All three Union Pines bands, the Concert Band, the Symphonic Band, and the Wind Ensemble, have competed in North Carolina, New York City, Orlando, Washington D.C., Chicago, Boston, Atlanta and represented NC bands in the National Festival of States Performance in San Antonio, Texas. They have also consistently received superior and excellent ratings. The Union Pines High Wind Ensemble has placed first place in their division a number of times, playing the highest graded level of music, grade level VI. In addition to their top rating, the Wind Ensemble has taken top honors for highest overall score of the competition and was awarded the prestigious William D. Revelli Concert Band

Award, which is an award of distinction. The concert bands have also received additional awards for outstanding soloists. As a result of these recognitions, the Union Pines High Band is regarded as one of the top bands in the Southeastern District and in the state of North Carolina. Also, many of the Union Pines Band students audition for and make the All-County Band, the All-District Band, the All-State Band, and Governor's school. Many of the Union Pines Band students also march Drum Corps International, considered to be the major leagues of marching band, in top corps such as Carolina Crown, Glassmen, Crossmen, and Spirit of Atlanta.

According to Mr. Hill, a very small percentage of the bands throughout the state that compete receive superior ratings. "Our groups are impressive," he said. "They are extremely talented and perform well because they have a tremendous sense of pride in what they do and their expectation is to give outstanding performances all of the time. They feel they owe it to their audience, and I do as well. The process to perform at these levels is rigorous. The bands spend a large amount of time in and out of the classroom preparing until the day of performance where they are evaluated on stage by a panel of judges. In order to receive a superior rating, the performance on stage should basically sound like a group of professional musicians recording a CD. All the aspects of professional musicianship are the qualities that are expected during performance. If a band plays well, they prove that they have learned the many musical concepts it takes to perform, and possess the knowledge and understanding of what it is to be great musicians."

Requirements to Participate in the Marching Band

1. Dedication
2. Hard work and a positive attitude
3. A completed contract, health form, parent form, and registration form which is to be turned into Mr. Hill. You cannot participate in the group without these forms!
4. Band fees which must be paid according to schedule. We have a payment plan to allow monthly payments.
5. It is highly recommended that you, in addition to marching band in the fall, sign up for concert band in the spring. We are able to compete at the highest possible levels of music because the majority of band students consistently take band each semester during their 4 years at Union Pines.

Benefits to Your Student

1. **Structure & Organization**—The Marching Vikings is a structured organization with a focus on excellence in performance and behavior that is developed through discipline, teamwork, and pride.
2. **Guaranteed Involvement**—Marching band is the truest of team sports. No one is left sitting on the bench, and no one is second string—every band member has a role that supports the overall performance and, in turn, its success.
3. **Time Management**—Marching Vikings quickly learn to use every minute of their day wisely as they balance practicing with schoolwork and other activities.
4. **A Sense of Pride**—You'll see the excitement and smiles on their faces when they nail a performance. Marching Vikings put forth their best effort when it's show time and are proud of what they accomplish.
5. **Punctuality**—Marching Vikings learn to be punctual. Call times are given for practices, games, and competitions. A call time is not an arrival time; instead, it is the time students should be prepared to start.
6. **Prioritization**—Band rehearsals and homework take up a lot of free time. Your student will learn to prioritize these to be successful.
7. **A Second Family**—Sometimes it will seem like our kids spend more time with the band family than our own families. Your child will make lifelong friends and memories as a Marching Viking.

Attendance Policy

In order for this Marching Band to reach greatness, it is important that we use our practice time wisely. Your commitment to this band will be directly affected by your attendance and preparation for each Scheduled Band Activity (SBA). A SBA is a current activity that is scheduled on the calendar. This includes rehearsals and performances. The attendance policy will go into effect upon the first day of rehearsal in June. The entire band is a chain. One weak link will cause the chain to not perform at its full potential. Each person in the band is important, and it is important to be at each SBA.

There are unavoidable absences. These must be cleared at least one week in advance with the Director. The only event that will be permitted is an emergency. An absence will be considered excused if:

- You have a medical emergency, accompanied by a physician's note
- There is a death in your family

If at all possible, please let us know when an emergency occurs, so we do not worry or wonder where you are.

*Rookie Week for first year marchers and Band Camp for the entire band is absolutely **Mandatory!***

***Parents, please plan vacations around
Mini Band Camps and Band Camp!!!***

Employment is not an excuse for missing a rehearsal or a performance. Any student who misses a rehearsal or performance due to work will be charged with an unexcused absence and your grade will be lowered accordingly.

Each student is expected to come to rehearsals and performances prepared and ready to participate to the fullest of their ability. Any student that comes to a rehearsal or performance and does not actively participate will be subject to disciplinary action. This includes, but is not limited to: forgetting an instrument; not having a reed, mouthpiece, sticks, mallets, or flags; not having music; or not having the correct shoes for marching, etc.

General Rules of Conduct

Rehearsal Etiquette

A well-defined and executed rehearsal technique has a direct impact on the success of the group. It is expected that all members adhere to the following rehearsal etiquette.

1. Be in the right place, at the right time, with the right equipment. You should have the following items with you at all rehearsals:
 - a. Instruments
 - b. Drill book with drill sheets
 - c. Pencil; you will need to write several things down on your music and drill at every rehearsal. It is very difficult to remember everything from rehearsal to rehearsal.
 - e. Water jugs; this is very important to have. Marching Band is a very active and physical activity. You will need water. We do not want people passing out due to dehydration. Every member should have their own water jug or bottle, especially in the summer months. Water will also be provided for all students during the two weeks of band camp.

All band members should dress comfortably and appropriately for all rehearsals. It is important for you to realize that we will be outside and moving. It is also up to you to watch the weather forecast and to dress for it. Appropriate clothing for rehearsals include: t-shirts, shorts, sweats, and tennis shoes (no sandals, dress shoes, or jeans).

Talking during a rehearsal when brought to attention is restricted to staff, drum major, and section leaders only. There will be many people on the field 130+. The staff cannot and will not talk over you. Remember, "When the talking starts, learning stops." Do not waste rehearsal time by talking. If you have a comment or question during a rehearsal, wait until the appropriate time. We will give you plenty of breaks at which you can socialize.

Rehearsal etiquette is the same no matter who is conducting.

It is a proven fact that both positive and negative attitudes are contagious. You are expected to exhibit a positive and cooperative attitude at all times. Any student exhibiting a consistent negative, demeaning, or undermining attitude towards staff, parents, students, or the Union Pines High School Band program will be subject to a permanent removal from the group. Such violations may result in a conference involving the Director of the Band, the Parents/Guardians of the student, the student, and appropriate school administrator(s).

Performance Etiquette

1. If you are on time you're late, if you're early, you're on time! Do not be late! The times to be ready to perform or rehearse before a game, competition, or other event will be announced prior to the event.
2. March to and from the stadium with pride. The uniform is to be worn PROPERLY at all times. Your performance begins as soon as we march to the stadium or get off the bus for a parade or competition. It does not end until you are dismissed by the Director or Drum Major. Do not break ranks until instructed to do so. When marching in ranks you should be tall and proud. Do not let anyone outside of the band cut through the ranks. Do not talk when marching in rank!
3. You may not eat or drink in your uniform, except for water. Accidents will occur unexpectedly that may soil, stain, or permanently damage your uniform. You will be instructed at performances as to when it is appropriate to remove your band jacket and get something to eat and drink.
4. Do not lean or sit on anything that will soil, tear, or snag your uniform.
5. While at a performance it is imperative that you sit with your designated section.
6. There are to be no visitors in the designated band area during a football game. Only Union Pines Marching Band members, chaperones, instructors, and administrators are allowed in the band's section in the stands. This is important from the standpoint of your safety. There will be no exceptions to this rule.
7. The general rule is that if you have any questions regarding whether you should or should not be doing something in uniform, DO NOT DO IT!! When you are wearing the uniform, you are not looked upon by others as an individual, but rather as a part of the Union Pines High School Marching Band. Most of the spectators and band members from other groups who will see you behind the scenes will form their opinion of the *Entire Band* from their opinion of how *you* behave in uniform.

Uniforms

The Union Pines Marching Vikings take pride in their uniforms. These are VERY expensive! Each student will be fitted and issued a uniform to be kept at Union Pines. Each student is responsible for making sure their uniform is turned in at the end of competitions for dry cleaning. If your uniform needs adjustments, DO NOT wait until the day of a competition/performance to let the uniform chairperson know. As soon as you know there's a problem, please let us know. All students will be issued game day bibbers (marching pants) to be worn at home football games. These pants are to be washed by the student/parent. Only seniors will return their game pants at the end of the year. All other band members will keep their pants until the end of their senior year.

Things you need to purchase and wear at each performance:

1. Underwear – Please wear something under the bibs. Shorts or running tights are also advised
2. Black knee high socks (NO ANKLE SOCKS – MUST BE KNEE HIGH)
3. Black shoe polish for shoes (marching shoes are called “Dinkles”). Dinkles can also be cleaned with 409 or another mild cleaner. Mr. Clean Magic Erasers also work wonders on the shoes!
- 4. CLEAN YOUR BAND SHOES THE NIGHT BEFORE!**
5. Girls need bobby pins and rubber bands for their hair
6. There should be ONLY 2 hangers in your bag one for your bibbers (pants) and one for your jacket. PLEASE utilize these hangers. Our NEW uniforms are custom made, only we have them, therefore they are expensive!
7. PLEASE take care of your gloves and gauntlets! Know where they are before any competition!
- 8. When a fitting day is assigned to you PLEASE BE THERE!!!!!! It's hard to guess on uniforms. A fitting is a must!**
9. Be **PROUD** of your uniform and treat it with respect. IF you damage it, you will have to pay for it....so, be nice to it!

Dress Code When out of Uniform

Each band student will be issued a show shirt and blue polo shirt.

- Show shirts are to be worn to all competitions and will be worn underneath the band jacket.
- The blue polo shirt is to be worn for other performances such as parades or pep band.

Khaki shorts and blue jeans will need to be provided by each band student.

Purchase these in the summer *BEFORE* the first football game (in August).

Typically the band will wear either Khaki shorts or blue jeans with either the polo or the show shirt early in the season before they start wearing the uniform.

- Shirts will be tucked in for performances
- Remember – YOU represent Union Pines High School
- Wear your shirts with pride!

Band Commitment
According to the Following Schedule

Marching Band is unlike any other activity at Union Pines High School. Although it meets during class as a full group, it also meets after school for sectional rehearsals (once a week on a designated day to avoid conflict with sports) and on Saturdays for rehearsals before competitions. All of these times outside of the regular class time are a **REQUIRED** part of the class and the student's grade depends upon his/her participation. This class actually begins during the summer months to get ready for competitions and football half time shows. This requires many hours of inside and outside practice. Once the numbers are set, the show is written, the drill is taught and the camp is over, **we are committed** to perform and compete with the show we have learned. If a student backs out at this point, the entire band suffers because having a hole in the drill, or lacking certain instrumentation musically in the show will negatively affect our grade or rating as a group in competition. This slows down our progress and would be a major setback. To help eliminate this problem we are requiring the signing of this contract to be sure the student and parent(s) understand the commitment necessary.

During the marching season it is understood that band members must put Marching Band rehearsals and performances at the top of their list of priorities.

The summer is extremely busy, but for a very good reason. The hard work and time will pay off to be a very rewarding experience for band students and parents.

Items to Bring to Band Camp

- Students MUST bring a container/cooler to keep water in during the day. We spend long days outside in the sun. Students who do not have water run the risk of getting heat exhaustion, heat stroke, etc... A cooler with water is essential! Supplemental water is provided during the long days of camp.
- Tennis shoes/sneakers are the only acceptable footwear while marching! NO FLIP FLOPS or SANDALS!!
- Students should bring sun block, hats, sunglasses, etc... to protect them from the sun.
- Bug spray is highly recommended
- Gold Bond Powder
- Basketball style nylon shorts are the best to stay cool
- Compression shorts underneath can help with chafing
- A hand towel or a "Frog Tog" (you can get at Bed, Bath, and Beyond)

***LUNCH AND DINNER IS ON YOUR OWN.**

You can either bring a lunch or go out to eat, but you must be back on time.

Band Fees

Due to a limited budget, we, as students and boosters must provide additional funds for transportation, uniforms, major equipment, extra clinics, and general operating expense. The following expenses are outside of the band budget and need to be paid to the Union Pines Band. You can send a check* or money order to:

BAND FEES FOR ALL WIND PLAYERS ARE \$350 BAND FEES FOR COLORGUARD AND PERCUSSION ARE \$400

- One-time payment of \$350 or \$400 depending on being a wind player, percussionist or color guard member would be due by April 1, 2018.

OR

- Can split into 3 payments:
 - The first payment of \$150 or \$200 depending once again on whether or not you are a wind player, percussionist, of color guard member, is due April 1, 2018. This initial deposit will secure a spot in the band. If payments are not received on time, the spot will be deleted or filled with another marcher. The initial planning for this year's marching show is already underway.
 - The second payment of \$100 is due by May 1, 2018
 - Final payment or \$100 is due June 1, 2018.

Band fees pay for:

Music, Drill Writing, Additional Instructors, Band Polo Shirt, Show Shirt, Shoes, Gloves, Dry Cleaning, Uniform Rental, New Bibbers, Instrument Maintenance, and Transportation Costs.

 **I understand that Band Fees are used to purchase drill/music; therefore, band fees are non-refundable.**

 **All band fees are due by JUNE 1, 2018.
No exceptions!**

Band Fees Explained

Because of the significant cost associated with fielding a competitive marching band, band fees must be assessed for students to participate. Fees are calculated to be a “fair share” of the costs required to field the band and are shared by all members. These fees pay for:

Travel: The band is responsible for the cost of all travel. The band must pay for the use of activity buses when traveling to competitions and other events. If qualified volunteer bus drivers are not available, the band must also pay district bus drivers a standard rate for their time. The band may utilize charter buses from time to time. In addition, the band must foot the cost for maintaining the band trailers as well as fuel to move each trailers to various events.

Competitions: The band must pay a registration fee for each competition in which it participates.

Special Staff: Both the color guard and the drumline are directed by special staff who are hired by the Booster Club. This staff brings a level of expertise to these sections that is vital to a competitive band program.

Show: The band is responsible for purchasing all of the materials necessary to field a marching show each season, including music, drill, choreography, copyrights, and visual enhancements.

Instruments: Maintenance and care for instruments is incredibly important, and the purchase and ongoing maintenance of its instruments can be costly. The band provides many of the instruments necessary for a marching show, including sousaphones, sideline percussion, and more.

Uniforms: The band is responsible for the purchase and upkeep of its marching uniforms. While uniforms are used for many years, the up-front cost is quite expensive. Additionally, upkeep costs such as dry cleaning, are necessary to keep uniforms in top shape. Color guard uniforms are updated annually to reflect the tone of the show. Band students also receive a show shirt annually and a polo shirt that can be used for multiple years as part of their overall band wardrobe.

Administrative Costs: The band boosters have ongoing expenses that are necessary to support the needs of the band, including accounting software, tax preparation, office supplies, insurance, website hosting.

The Band Boosters meet at 6:00 p.m. on the third Tuesday of each month. The meetings are held in the UPHS band room.

The Union Pines Band annually hosts *The Viking Classic* marching band competition. This event will bring approximately 3,000 people from North Carolina and other states. Many of these people are from surrounding cities and counties. **MARK YOUR CALENDERS!!** This year's Viking Classic will be held on Saturday, October 27, 2018 at Union Pines High School. You will need to be there from 7:30 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. There are months of preparation involved which we will need all parent/booster volunteers. This is a huge undertaking but also our largest fundraiser for the band. Without the Classic, our band would be severely underfunded. So, make sure your calendar is clear on that day...**WE NEED YOU!**

End of Marching Season Dinner

Each year, after our last marching competition, we head to Cracker Barrel in Sanford (they stay open just for us!) to reminisce about the season. This is a great time for staff, students and parents. There will be a limited menu available which will be emailed to you when the time comes. Please make sure you plan attending this fun event!

Second Semester

Concert, Symphonic and Wind Ensemble Bands

It is extremely important to continue playing your instrument throughout the year. Make sure you sign up for band 2nd semester as well when you sign up for classes. We are a powerhouse band and we are that way because 99 percent of the band continues to play their instrument each and every semester until they graduate. The concert band is primarily freshman; the symphonic band – primarily sophomores; the wind ensemble-primarily juniors and seniors have competed in North Carolina, Florida, New York City, Chicago, Boston, Atlanta and San Antonio. These bands consistently receive superior and excellent ratings. The concert band and symphonic band are building years to get to the wind ensemble, which competes in the most difficult category, playing the highest and most difficult music, grade level VI. They have been awarded the prestigious William D. Revelli Concert Band Award, which is an award of distinction and they have taken first place in many events with additional awards such as outstanding soloists. As a result of these recognitions, the Union Pines High School Band is regarded as one of the top bands in the Southeastern District and in the State of North Carolina. In 2010 they were invited to represent the state of North Carolina in the National Independence Day Parade in Washington D.C.

Dress Code for Concert, Symphonic Band, and Wind Ensemble

This attire also must be provided by students on their own.

- Black dress shoes, black socks, black bow tie, and black belt

All County, All District, and All State Bands

Students also have the opportunity to try out for All County Band, All District Band, and possibly All State Band, depending on how high a chair a potential student may place during the audition. These are auditioned based groups for students who wish to go above and beyond the standard. These auditions are also a requirement for future band leadership....section leaders, captains, and drum majors. All-County auditions take place in early November, All-District auditions take place in early January, and the All-State auditions typically take place in March (if All State eligible depending on chair placement at All District). DCI (Drum Corps International)

Each summer (typically the last weekend in July...TBA), the band takes a bus to a drum corps competition in Charlotte. Drum Corps International is considered to be the major league of marching band. This is highly recommended but not mandatory. Each student who wants to go MUST sign up and pay for their ticket by the first of June. Tickets are \$50 a person, which includes transportation. This is a WONDERFUL opportunity for the students to experience band competitions at their finest! You may want to bring some extra money for food and souvenirs. Sign-ups will be in the later part of May. There is a band booster page on Facebook where you can check for updates and announcements.

Frequently Asked Questions

Is there a fee to participate in marching band?

Yes. A payment schedule will be announced for the 2018-2019 season. We break the fee into smaller payments spread over several months.

Why are there band fees?

The band fee supports the budget for the year, and is used to pay for operational expenses of the band, including transportation costs (including the use of school system owned activity buses), music, uniforms, major equipment, and extra clinics. The Band Boosters conduct numerous fundraisers throughout the year to keep these fees as low as possible.

What is the Booster Club?

The Union Pines Band Booster Club is the booster organization that supports our program. The Booster Club provides a group of volunteers who support the band staff and students throughout the school year. Volunteers handle areas such as transportation, uniforms, logistics, pit crewing, and more. Additionally, the booster club organizes fundraising opportunities to help the band meet its financial obligations while reducing the financial impact on families. The club also provides assistance to those with financial hardship who would otherwise be unable to participate.

Does the band practice all summer?

No. You can find the band schedule at www.unionpinesband.com.

Are all practices required?

YES!!! Practices and rehearsals are crucial to the success of the band. The Marching Vikings perform music and drills at a level of difficulty many band programs are not capable of; members must learn and memorize 50-60 pages of marching drill and music before performances begin in the fall. The show's foundation is set during band camp, and continued rehearsals build on that foundation. As a **highly competitive marching band**, hard work, dedication, and perseverance are expected at all rehearsals.

Additionally, it is important to understand marching band is unlike any other activity at Union Pines High School. Although the band meets during class time during the school year, it also meets for sectional rehearsals and Saturday rehearsals before departing for competitions. While these times are outside of regular class times, they are required and will make up part of your child's overall grade. Your commitment agreement is used to set the overall size of the band and design the show. Once the band begins learning drill, **we are committed** to perform and compete with the show we have learned.

What is rookie camp?

Rookie camp is essentially an orientation week for new marching band students. The directors and student leaders teach the fundamentals of marching and visuals during this week. Rookie week is **MANDATORY** for freshman and other first time Marching Vikings.

Who is required to attend band camp?

Band camp is mandatory for all marching band students—no exceptions! The band directors and student leaders need all band members to be present during all scheduled rehearsals to ensure the success of the program. One absent member will disrupt rehearsal for all members of the band. Please help your student be on time and present for the entire session. Marching band class actually begins during the summer, and the grade of students who miss band camp or other rehearsals **will be affected**.

A good rule of thumb to live by in the marching band world: “If you are early, you are on time. If you are on time, you are late. If you are late, you are in trouble.”

What does my child need to bring to band camp?

First and foremost, a water cooler and sunscreen. Volunteers will supplement water throughout the day, but students should come prepared with their own water daily. Student should wear comfortable athletic style shoes as they will be on their feet most of the day; flip flops are not allowed. We also recommend hats with visors and sunglasses for additional sun protection, as well as insect repellent. For comfort, we recommend students wear breathable, moisture-wicking fabrics. **DON'T FORGET THE SUNSCREEN**—carrying a sousaphone with a sunburn is no fun!

What other practices are required?

Beginning in May and continuing throughout the summer, your student will attend sectional rehearsals once a week, on either Tuesday or Thursday at 1:00 PM. Full band rehearsals will be held every Tuesday and Thursday from 3:00 PM – 5:00 PM.

When is marching band season?

Marching band begins in late May with sectionals and continues through mid-November. In addition to band competitions and football games, the Marching Vikings perform at parades throughout Moore County.

What does my child need to bring to competitions and football games?

Your child's bibbers have a small pocket that can hold cash to be used at concessions. Many students like to have a blanket for the ride home from competition (we get back late!). Please note, the band cannot be held responsible for any lost or stolen property, including property left on buses during events.

How will my child be transported to band competitions and away football games?

Your child is **required** to ride bus transportation to and from all games and competitions.

Glossary of Band Terms

If you are new to the marching band world, you may feel like you're learning a new language. Here's a quick guide to help you figure out what your student, other parents, or the announcer at the competition is talking about. Before you know it, you'll be speaking fluent band too!

Band parents – The fanatical group of adults who support the Marching Vikings and keep the band running on all cylinders. Appreciated by Marching Vikings even though they may be too cool to say so to their own immediate family members. Prepared with a trunk full of black socks and sunscreen to keep their Marching Vikings in the best shape possible for performances.

Bagging uniforms – The process of handing and storing marching uniforms following competitions, using an assigned garment bag. Typically conducted at the conclusion of home football games or after the band arrives back at Union Pines following competitions or away football games. As it involves folding and hanging pants, band parents give frequent lessons.

Band camp – The two weeks each summer when Marching Vikings are indoctrinated... er... learn the drill for the season's performance. Mandatory. Required. Not optional. As in **DO NOT MISS IT**. The days are long. The days are hot. The days are worth it. Your Marching Viking might complain, but we promise they will survive. They'll learn perseverance, endurance, and teamwork. We'll have volunteers there forcing water on them and reminding them to reapply sunscreen. Five years from now they'll realize they miss it. Twenty years from now they'll remember band camps as some of the greatest times of their lives.

Battery – The drum line that marches on the field. Having trouble keeping things straight? The Energizer bunny marched with your drum and had a battery on his back. Also, much like the Energizer bunny, drummers keep going and going and going...

Bibbers – Bibbed pants worn as part of the marching uniform. Similar in appearance to overalls. Have a pocket that will hold band parents' money.

Black socks – A crucial, but often overlooked, component of the band uniform. Black socks suffer from the same affliction as their other sock brethren and tend to go missing, often right before competitions. You don't want your kid to be the kid with the white socks radiating between the black Dinkles and black bibbers. You should know, their fellow band members aren't above using a marker to tone that down. You know they are going to disappear, so buy in bulk, keep some in your car, and be a hero when you swoop in with a pair to save the day. Related terms: **Band Parents, Bibbers, Dinkles, Uniform.**

BOA – Bands of America. This is a non-profit educational organization that is the leading presenter of music events for high school band students in the US. The Marching Vikings compete at its regional event in Winston-Salem each fall.

Coffee – The life force that flows through Mr. Hill's veins. He'll drink coffee from anywhere... except Subway. If you see Mr. Hill without a cup, you may want to question all the fundamental truths you hold dear.

Color Guard – Marching Vikings who add visual impact to the musical performance through the use of flags, rifles, sabers, dancing, and marching.

Competitions – Events held on Saturdays throughout the fall where various marching bands converge and compete in high schools stadiums across the region. Bands compete against other bands in their **class** (a grouping based on the number of band members, with some slight variations). Classes can range from A all the way up to AAAAA, and the Marching Vikings typically compete at the AAAA or AAAAA level.

Cracker Barrel – Southern style restaurant. The band heads here after the last competition of the season to celebrate their hard work and accomplishments. Band students have first dibs on seating. Sorry parents, for this night only, the kids table is the best seat in the house.

DCI – Drum Corps International. The pinnacle of marching bands, these professional level corps made up of college-aged musicians (including UP alumni) and Color Guards are seen creating amazing formations and visuals while playing highly difficult music. Marching Vikings have the option to attend a DCI show in Winston-Salem in July. Marching Vikings and band parents may also be found viewing DCI shows on YouTube with some frequency.

Dinkles – Marching shoes worn as part of the marching uniform. They are black. They get dirty. Shoe polish, Mr. Clean Magic Erasers, or 409 help a lot.

Dots – Specific points on the marching field that are used to represent each band member's place in a formation.

Drill – The marching choreography of the show involving the patterns in which the band marches while performing show music. That's right—***Marching Vikings march and play at the same time!***

Drill Charts – A symbolic representation of what each marching formation should look like.

Drum Line – All Marching Vikings who play percussion instruments, including the battery and the pit.

Football games – The sporting exhibitions that occur on fall Friday nights before and after the Marching Vikings' halftime performances.

Grand Champion – Top award at a band competition, it can be awarded to a band from any class.

Hangry – The emotion exhibited by a Marching Viking who has finished their performance and is now waiting in the long line at the concession stand. Can be prevented or alleviated by the use of a band parent's money.

"It's All Good" – A phrase you will hear 9,999,999 times over the next four years. Mr. Hill's mantra, adopted by students and parents alike.

Money – What your Marching Viking will request when they actually acknowledge you in public at competitions or football games. Once the money has been acquired, you will no longer be acknowledged by that Marching Viking, but other parents not related to them will be. Can be used to prevent or cure hangriness.

Pit – Marching Vikings who play instruments on the sideline during the performance and do not march on the field. Also known as the "front ensemble." Don't worry though—pit performers make

up for the exercise they miss out on by not marching by pushing, pulling, lifting, loading, and generally moving their massive instruments.

Pit Crew – An award-winning group of band parents who function as a well-oiled machine to assist the Pit with the movement of sideline equipment and set up and break down sound systems for performances. Capable of setting up for a performance in under four minutes.

Plume – The large feather worn on the marching uniform hat. While it looks similar, it's not a quill, so please don't use it to write out your check for those band fees.

Sectional – Scheduled practice for Marching Vikings who play the same instrument or instrument category that allow members of each section to practice their specific music or visuals. Marching Vikings should reach out to their section leaders with any questions.

Show shirt – The t-shirt each Marching Viking is issued at the start of competition season highlighting the year's show. Worn underneath bibbers to competitions so band parents can find our Marching Vikings in a crowd. Similar to black socks, you'll probably want at least one extra because kids get smelly on hot August Friday nights and band parents don't want to do laundry before Saturday competitions. Also available for purchase by band parents for their own use so other band parents can identify each other in a crowd and show their UP spirit at competitions.

Trombone Suicide – Some things are better to see in person. A good reason to come to a football game.

Viking Classic – Band competition hosted by the Union Pines Marching Vikings. This is our biggest fundraiser of the year and we need help from everyone to make it a success. Volunteer, hang out with fellow band parents, and help us make money to keep band fees as low as possible.

Volunteers – Synonymous with band parents, this is the group of people that keep the band marching on. Volunteers come in a wide variety, including chaperones, water distributors, Viking Classic cooks, parking attendants, and bus drivers... and that doesn't cover everything! You'll hear words like "thank you" from teenagers. A perfect way to meet other band parents.

Water – Also known as "liquid gold," it's a life giving substance that band parents hover about and force Marching Vikings to drink during band camp. It's okay, it really is for their own good.

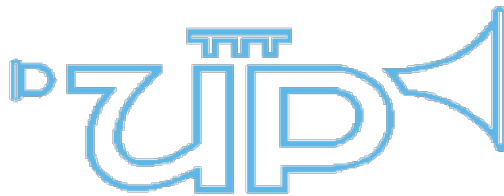
